

CAB Lowers Crop Estimate But Raises Exports Estimate Substantially

At its recent meeting held in Mumbai under the Chairmanship of Shri A.B. Joshi, Textile Commissioner, the Cotton Advisory Board (CAB) has made a few revisions in its previous estimates made in December 2009. The most important is that while a marginal reduction of three lakh bales has been made in the estimate of production, that on exports this year has been raised substantially by 25 lakh bales. This has led to the estimated closing stock being lower by as much as 31 lakh bales than the opening stock.

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While the production this year is expected to be slightly higher than last year in the north and central zones, it is expected to be lower in the south zone owing to a fall in Andhra Pradesh crop. The State where production is expected to be significantly higher than last year is Gujarat. Rajasthan is also expected to harvest a slightly higher crop.

According to the Cotton Corporation of India (CCI), cotton arrivals upto the beginning of April this year have aggregated to 264.35 lakh bales as against 256.50 lakh bales by the same time last year. Expectedly, the arrivals in Gujarat this year have surpassed last year's quantity by as much as about 12 lakh bales.

While the CAB has retained its estimate of imports at the same level as 7 lakh bales, the estimate of export has been raised substantially from the earlier 55 lakh bales to 80 lakh bales now. The estimated exports in 2008-09 were 35 lakh bales. The present increase seems to be in line with the data on export registrations maintained by the Textile Commissioner according to which registrations have crossed 79 lakh bales while shipments are over 54 lakh bales.

The opening stock this year was more than double that of last year. However, the closing stock is estimated to be 31 lakh bales lower than the opening stock. It is likely that his may impart bullish sentiment to the market fuelling an all round price rise.

Cotton Exports Cross 52 lakh bales by March

In contrast to the situation last year, conditions this year have been quite favourable for stepping up exports of raw cotton from the Country. For instance, there is sizeable exportable surplus, prices are competitive and the overseas demand is quite good. Due to these, exports of raw cotton have already exceeded 52 lakh bales by March 2010, as against 16.4 lakh bales by the same period last year and 35 lakh bales during the whole year. The month-wise details of export registrations and shipments, as available from the office of the Textile Commissioner are given below :

Although a fall in shipments is noticed in February and March, the overall quantity shipped is more than three times that in 2008-09. Looking to the overall situation, it appears that the total shipments during 2009-10 may equal the Cotton Advisory Board's estimate of 80 lakh bales. It is pertinent to mention that the Association has recently estimated the exports at 72 lakh bales. With the world cotton prices continuing to remain firm, Indian prices remain competitive. Further, several Countries are looking to India for supplies since the traditional suppliers like US are unable to meet the demand owing to a fall in their domestic cotton production. Evidence of this can be seen in the fact that India has displaced US as the leading source for Chinese cotton import in February.

<u>SNIPPETS</u>

India has displaced US as the leading supplier of raw cotton to China. According to published data, Chinese imports from India amounted to 95,100 tonnes in February as against 58,814 tonnes from US. Similarly, during the seven-month period from August 2009 to February 2010, China imported 475,538 tonnes from India as against 287,031 tonnes from US. The two factors that may have led to India being the leading supplier to China are the price competitiveness of Indian cotton and the fall in exportable surplus in US owing to a drop in domestic production.

Issue of Certificates of Origin (Non-Preferential)

The CAI has been enlisted by the Director General of Foreign Trade, New Delhi and is authorized us to issue Certificates of Origin (Non-Preferential). This service has already been commenced by CAI from 20th November 2008.
